TRAINING AT TRUMAN

Season Plan

The season strategy is broken down throughout the year into month to month, week to week and even day to day strategies. For the most part the team is broken into three distinct groups; sprints, middle distances and distances.

Preparation Phase

The preparation phase builds basic endurance and technique. The swimmer begins to get a feel for the water. Ideally, this phase should be as short as possible because the swimmers already should be at that level coming into the season. The team swims basic aerobic sets, mixes in different strokes and emphasizes technique. On land, the swimmers mix in some running and general strength training: push ups, dips, pull ups, jumps, etc. Another component emphasized is core body strength. The first few weeks are spent teaching the team all of the core exercises that are built on the rest of the year.

Aerobic Phase

The purpose of the aerobic phase is to build an aerobic base. The sprinters' training differs from distance swimmers in this case. An aerobic foundation aids in recovery time following race pace, enhances ability to maintain speed through efficiency, and aids in reinforcing proper technique and body position. The latter half of September and the majority of October focuses on building aerobic capacity.

Race Pace Fall Phase

Gradually, the team builds in more race specific training for each group. ATP (short sprints), lactate adaptation, lactate tolerance and broken swims are techniques used to get individuals used to swimming in racing conditions. Since the team is competing nearly every weekend through this phase, training is set up for recovery just prior to most meets.

Fall Taper

Much of the team tapers for a large meet in December. Thanksgiving break provides a time for real recovery and light, loosen-up swimming. The week prior to the December meet, intensity will be reduced, but the training time will remain constant. Following an early December rest, training is switched to an aerobic base regimen,

which continues until finals end and the team breaks for the Christmas holidays.

Winter Break and Florida Trip

Training at home over the break is highly recommended. The Florida trip is the biggest team-building opportunity of the season. Team cohesion and leadership in order to achieve success are worked on in Florida. Training emphasizes a mix of basic aerobic swimming, VO2 max training and a little lactate production. It includes both long course and short course, as well as daily dry land workouts. The Florida trip is a challenging week.

Race Pace Spring Phase

In January, sprint training, lactate tolerance and broken swims resume. Each swimmer learns their stroke rate (tempo) for each race. Swimmers concentrate on strategy and on how to mentally prepare for their races.

Final Taper

This is the final sharpening and tuning stage. Time to rest and recover the body is allowed, while at the same time, the team sharpens tempo and pacing skills. Ideally, taper is three weeks or less, and many times, distance swimmers and some of the middle distance women will rest one week or less.

Mental Training

The team spends time on positive thinking. A positive team attitude and atmosphere facilitates positive habits and life skills. Respect and support of teammates is encouraged. Short term and long term goals are set. Visualizing positive outcomes in training, daily life and competitions is practiced.

Dry land

Early in the season, building muscular endurance is emphasized, laying the foundation to a strong, flexible, fit body for the year. As the season progresses, the team builds in more power oriented exercises. By the peak performance zones (December, February-March) as much specific muscular power and endurance as possible is created in order to help the mind and body push through all-out maximal racing efforts again and again. Muscular and joint flexibility, shoulder strength, core body strength and dynamic movements are concentrated on throughout the season.

Weight Training

Weight training is primarily used to build general muscle strength, endurance and power. Weight workouts are centered around several primary exercises, the leg squat, dead lift, hang cleans and bench press. Initially, strength building is emphasized, and the last phase incorporates power building. Significant strength gains are made by the team through the season.

Academic Excellence

Truman swimmers excel in and out of the water. Last year, the teams were recognized for their outstanding academic abilities by the College Swimming Coaches Association of America, by the Verizon Academic All-America Program and by the Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association conference.

Christine Gould was named an MIAA presidential scholar for the third straight year. Members of the team must have a cumulative grade point average of 4.0.

Alison Blyth, Kelli Dudley, Liz Hug, Bridget Riley and Jen Vogt were named CSCAA academic all-Americans.

Dudley also was named to the Verizon Academic All-District VII At-Large Second Team. Members are nominated and voted on after meeting minimum requirements of having sophomore status and a cumulative grade point average of 3.2.

Dudley, Hug, Riley and Vogt were also named academic all-MIAA. Members of the academic all-MIAA team must have won all-America honors and maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.5.

Several Truman swimmers were also named to the at-large MIAA commissioner's academic honor roll. To be a member, individuals must have a cumulative GPA of at 3.0, have completed at least two terms at the nominating institution and have sophomore athletic eligibility.

Women's Team Registers Truman's

The 2000-2001 women's swimming team has gone where no other team in the 101-year history of Truman athletics has gone - national champion territory.

The Bulldogs claimed the rights to the NCAA Division II National Championship title March 17, 2001, in Canton, Ohio, at the end of the four-day national meet. The victory was the culmination of a three-year run to the top, as the team already had secured third place in 1999 and second in 2000.

The 'Dogs led the 27 teams at the national competition after day one, but then they lost the top spot to Drury University after day two. By the close of the third day, the 'Dogs had reclaimed first place and were able to hold on to it through the final day of competition.

The 'Dogs tallied a total of 656 points throughout the meet, leaving a considerable margin between them and runner-up Drury, which had 610.5 points. The University of California-San Diego rounded out the top three with 413.5 points.

At the conclusion of the meet, the National Swim Coaches Association of America honored head coach Seth Huston as the women's coach of the year for the third straight year.

Bringing home her own collection of first place medals was Jess Martin, who after winning six national titles was named NCAA Division II women's swimmer of the year, and three months later the Honda NCAA Division II Athlete of the Year. She captured first prize in the 200- (1:50.32), 500-, 1,000- and 1,650-yard freestyles. She set the NCAA Division II record in

the 1,000 free (9:55.86) by finishing more than a lap ahead of her nearest competitor. She also set school marks in the 500 free (4:52.72) and in the 1,650 free (16:45.01). Also earning national champion honors in an individual event was Kelli Dudley, who took first in the 100-yard backstroke (57.34) to break the old Truman record.

Truman showed superiority with two relay teams, as well. The 200-yard freestyle relay team, which featured Sara Hatcher, Jess Martin, Katie May and Bryna Busch, won the event and set a new Truman record (1:34.17). The 800-yard freestyle relay team also finished first and broke a Truman record (7:31.03). Liz Hug, Andrea Newton, Katie May and Jess Martin were the competing members of the relay.

First Team National Championship

Finishing second were two more Truman relay teams. The 400-yard freestyle relay team of Sara Hatcher, Jess Martin, Katie May and Bryna Busch was the runner-up (3:26.24), while the 200-yard IM relay team of Kelli Dudley, Sara Hatcher, Liz Hug and Meghan Osborn placed second in (1:46.74). The 400-yard IM relay team of Kelli Dudley, Christie Williamsen, Liz Hug and Bryna Busch earned fifth place (3:55.43).

In other individual events, Dudley set Truman records with her second-place finishes in the 200-yard backstroke (2:02.72) and 400-yard IM (4:24.22). She also earned second-place honors in the 200-yard IM (2:04.78).

Katie May earned second in the 1,000-yard freestyle (10:12.36), third in the 100-yard backstroke (58.28), fourth in the 500-

yard freestyle (5:01.49) and fifth in the 200-yard backstroke (2:05.09). Also competing in backstroke were Krista Pray and Andrea Newton. Pray finished fourth in the

100-yard backstroke (58.61), 10th in the 200-yard backstroke (2:07.55) and 14th in the 100-yard butterfly (59.31). Newton took sixth in the 200-yard backstroke (2:05.75), eighth in the 100-yard backstroke (59.09), 10th in the 50-yard freestyle (24.53) and 12th in the 200-yard freestyle (1:54.63).

Bryna Busch garnered second place in the 50-yard freestyle (23.67) and the 200-yard freestyle (1:51.42), as well as fourth in the 100-yard freestyle (52.23) and 10th in the 500-yard freestyle (5:04.51). Sara Hatcher took second in the 100-yard freestyle (52.08) and third in the 50-yard freestyle (23.78). In more freestyle events, Bridget Riley finished third in the 1,650-yard freestyle (17:17.85), fourth in the 1,000-yard freestyle (10:21.56) and sixth in the 500-yard freestyle (5:04.22).

Liz Hug had a pair of sixth place finishes - in the 200-yard IM (2:06.65) and in the 100-yard butterfly (57.47), which set a new Truman record. She also took seventh in the 200-yard freestyle (1:54.21) and ninth in

500-yard freestyle (5:03.00).

Also competing at the national meet was Alison Blyth, who brought home ninth-place finishes in the 100-yard butterfly (58.51) and the 200-yard butterfly (2:08.83). Jen Vogt finished 16th in the 200-yard backstroke (2:10.67), while Christie Williamsen took 16th in the 400-yard IM (4:43.29) and set a Truman record (2:24.52) to finish 11th in the 200-yard breaststroke.

Several women earned all-America status, which is awarded to swimmers who finish in the top eight at the national meet. Honorable mention all-Americans were those who finished with ninth through 16th places.

On the men's side, Matt Pray became Truman's highest national finisher ever with his second-place finish in the 100-yard butterfly (49.28), also good for a school record. Robby Cooper was the only other Bulldog competitor, earning honorable-mention all-America for the first time at the meet. The men's team finished 16th out of 26 teams.

Record-setting performances throughout the season decorated the 'Dogs' road to the national title. The women registered a 6-2 dual record, losing to Florida State (Tallahassee) in early January by a nine-point spread and to Drury in early February by a minimal one-point margin. The team also won four tournaments, including the Central States Championship, the final regional competition.

Women's Season Preview

The 2001-02 women's swimming team is returning a roster full of all Americas after winning Truman's first national championship. Junior *Kelli Dudley*, sophomore *Katie May*, junior *Sara Hatcher* and junior *Liz Hug* all claimed national titles, either individually or as part of a relay team last year.

Other returning national qualifiers all-Americas include sophomore *Alison Blyth*, junior *Meghan Osborn*, sophomore *Krista Pray* and senior *Bridget Riley*.

The team is also marked by a large class of freshman. A few highlighted individuals include *Sarah Dance*, who should have good showings in the but-

terfly, backstroke and IM events. Newcomer *Sue Ellen Thoma* will add depth in the middle-distance freestyle, as well as in the IM, and *Michaela Osborn* is expected to be a big contributor in the breaststroke.

Riley and *Beth Joslin* will take the reins of senior leadership, serving as team captains.

FREESTYLE

Hatcher brings her national experience back to the sprint freestyle races after capturing second place in the 100 freestyle and third in the 50 freestyle. She was also a member of the championship 200 freestyle relay, second-place 400 freestyle relay and second-place 200 medley relay teams. Hatcher will be joined by sophomores *Calie Fulmer* and *Megan Pittman*, along with freshman *Christina Blose* and senior *Michelle Seck* will add depth.

Thoma will get some experience in the middle-distance events. Huston also has big expectations for freshman *Diana Betsworth*, who also could swim some distance freestyle races. Hug and May will return to the middle-distance events after being members of the national champion 800 freestyle relay team. Freshman *Cassie Roudebush* and sophomore *Lindsey Ehret* will also compete in the middle-distance events.

Junior *Ellen Frick* and Riley will be big contributors in the distance events, as well as Betsworth and Joslin. Freshmen *Meghan Vaughan* and *Sarah Wells* will also get experience in the distance freestyles.

BUTTERFLY

Blyth will lead the squad in the butterfly, scoring points in the event for the team last season at the national championship.

Hug will also spend some time with the butterfly races, as will a handful of newcomers. Dance, Blose and Vaughan should all get some experience in the

butterfly this season.

BACKSTROKE

The backstroke will be a solid part of the women's team this year, as Dudley, May and Pray all return with national finishes in the event.

Dudley won the national title in the 100 backstroke and placed second in the 200 backstroke. May posted third in the 100 backstroke, while Pray took 10th in the 200 backstroke at the national meet.

Providing considerable depth will be veterans *Kacie Rice* and *Christine Gould*, who are seniors, and sophomore *Sophie McKay*, who was a Canadian Olympic trial qualifier. Fresh faces in the backstroke events will be Dance and *Kelly VanDerKar*.

BREASTSTROKE

Junior *Meghan Osborn* and Dudley will be the top performers in the breaststroke, coming back from being members of the national runner-up 200 medley relay team. Junior *Diana Young*, freshman *Megan Losee* and Michaela Osborn should be solid contributors. Freshman *Jessica Kovarik* and junior *Amanda Shearer* will also get some time in the breaststroke events.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Dudley and Hug will start this season with lengthy resumes in the IM. Last season Dudley charted second-place finishes at nationals in the 200 IM, 400 IM and 200 medley relay, as well fifth-place in the 400 medley relay. Hug will also be a threat after being part of the second-place 200 medley relay and the fifth-place 400 medley relay squads. Individually, she captured sixth-place in the 200 IM.

Newcomers Wells, Thoma, Dance and Fetting will add depth to the squad, while Shearer will provide some experience to the IM events.

Men's Season Preview

The men's team will look to take a larger contingent of swimmers to the national meet this year after sending two swimmers to the DII championships last season.

The leading force will be junior *Matt Pray*, whose second-place finish in 2001 marked the highest national finish ever for a Truman men's swimmer. Joining him will be sophomore *Robby*

Cooper, who earned honorable-mention all-America for the first time last year.

Several other veterans who barely missed the national mark last season should be in the hunt to qualify for nationals this year. Senior *Kyle Sterup*, junior *Drew Yemm*, and sophomores *Brian Teson* and *Andy Harken* look to be strong forces to go all the way.

At the same time, 12 new faces make up the 2001-02 squad, so the young team could have some surprises.

Sterup, Pray and senior *Andy Ladrow* will take control as team captains.

FREESTYLE

Yemm will highlight the sprint freestyle races after improving quite a bit last season. Also looking better after some experience under his belt is sophomore *Vince Struble*, who is also looking to be an important freestyler in the sprints. Freshmen *Kyle Ediger* and *Nick Joslin* give depth to the events.

Junior *Jay Westensee* and *Ladrow* will likely be some of the top performers in the middle-distance events. Sophomore *Robby Cooper* and *Sterup* could see some time in the middle-distance relays, but they will also be strong contenders in the distance races. Freshman *Ashtyn Beek* should also get some experience in the middle-distance events.

Cooper, who finished 12th at nationals in the 1,000-yard freestyle and 13th in the 500-yard freestyle, and *Sterup*, who reached the "B" qualification mark in four freestyle events, will take control of the distance events. Sophomore *Ryan Jacobi* will also likely be a threat in the distance events after making some solid improvements last season. He qualified with "B" cuts a year ago in both the 1,000- and 1,650-yard freestyle.s

Providing more support will be freshmen *Eric Paden* and *Steve Koenig*.

BUTTERFLY

Pray's second-place finish in the 100-yard butterfly at nationals last season will put him in the front of the pack in this event. The all-America swimmer also finished ninth overall in the 200 butterfly. He will be joined by *Teson*, who made good strides toward the national meet last season by reaching a "B" cut in the 100-yard butterfly his freshman year.

Sophomore *Caleb Hopkins* and freshmen *Dustin Engels* and *Ben Buras* will add the extra depth for a strong squad of swimmers in butterfly events.

BACKSTROKE

Teson and sophomore *Bryan Meyer* will be contenders in the backstroke events. *Cooper* could also see some time as a backstroker.

However, this event will have plenty of room for younger team members to step up and contribute to the team.

BREASTSTROKE

Much will be expected of *Harken* this season, as he returns for his second season after making a "B" cut in the 200-yard breaststroke as a freshman. *Struble* will also bring some experience to the breaststroke events.

Newcomers *Justin Brosseau*, *Matt Peeples* and *Ryan Blase* could also prove to be assets in these events.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Harken, who made a "B" cut in the 200 IM last season, and *Teson* will come out as the strongest individual medley swimmers this season.

Paden, *Buras* and freshman *Phil Brown* will also be competitive in the IM events.

Head Coach Seth Huston



Seth Huston returns for his eighth year as head coach of the Truman swim teams after leading the 2001 women's team to the school's first-ever NCAA Division II title.

The women's team, which garnered 656 points to leave the former champion Drury University in second with 610.5 points, boasted national champions in five individual events and two relay teams.

The men's team finished 16th at the 2001 NCAA Division II national championships, claiming ninth the previous season for its highest national finish ever.

Huston's teams also fared well at the 2001 Central States Championship, which is considered the team's conference or regional meet. The women took first, beating defending-champion Drury, while the men repeated a third-place finish.

Last season the College Swim Coaches Association of America named Huston the women's coach of the year, an honor he also earned in 1998 and 2000. He has also been named the Mideast Classic Championship women's coach of the year five consecutive years.

Huston is 37 years old and a native of St. Louis. Huston earned a bachelor's degree in physical education from the University of Tampa in 1988 and a master's in exercise science from Texas Christian University in 1990.

He has held assistant coaching positions at Texas Christian University and the University of Tampa. While coaching at TCU, the men's team achieved its highest finish ever in the Southwest Conference. At the University of Tampa, Huston coached consecutive top-10 finishes at the NCAA Division II Championships, including second- and third-place finishes by the women's teams.

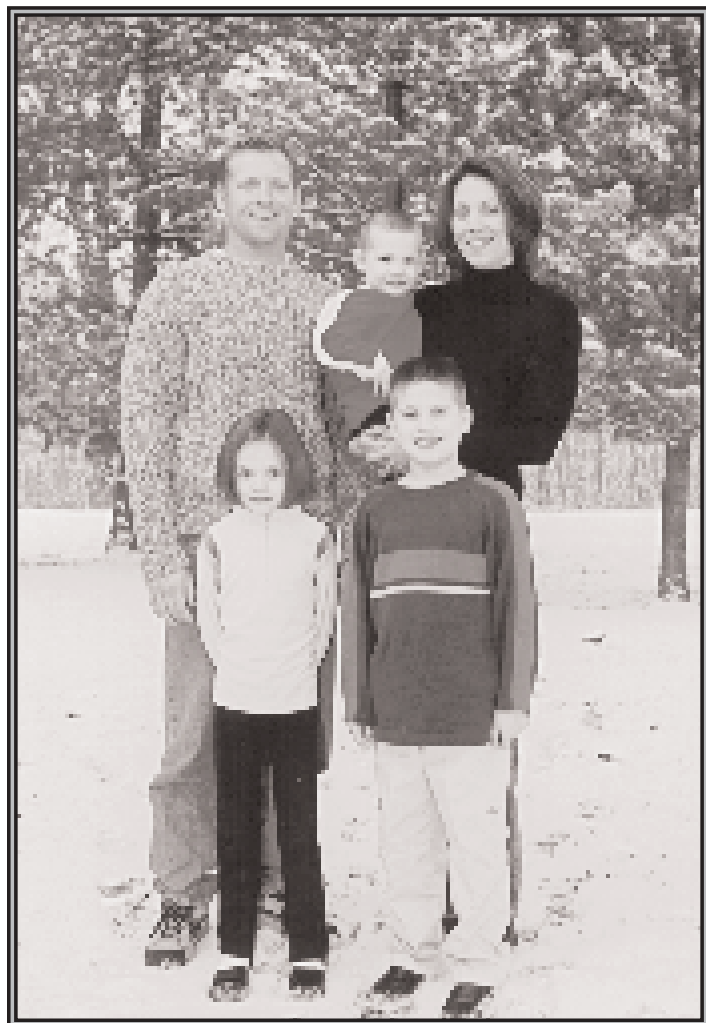
Huston served as program director and head coach of Katy Aquatics in Houston, Texas for four years. He built a program that produced three top-seven finishes at the Texas Age Group Championships, numerous state cham-

pions and a ninth-place men's finish at the 1994 Junior National Swimming Championships.

An active participant in the U.S. program, Huston has coached United States Swimming camps and zone teams. In 1991, he was named Gulf Age Group Coach of the Year. Huston is an ASCA Level 4 coach, having coached swimmers at all levels of excellence from NCAA all-Americans to Olympic Trial qualifiers.

Huston still trains and competes regularly in open water races in Master Swim Meets, a men's division. This fall he started up the Northeast Missouri (NEMO) swim team, a local USS swim club. He is also active as a Sunday school teacher at the First Presbyterian Church in Kirksville.

Huston resides in Kirksville with his wife, Amy, their two sons, 8-year-old Hobie and 2-year old Eli, and their daughter, 6-year-old Hanna.



Interim Assistant Coaches

Jess Martin is filling the assistant coach position after four decorated years on the Truman women's swimming team. As a member of the women's national championship team last year, she captured individual titles in the 200-, 500-, 1,000- and 1,650-yard freestyles.

In the 1,000-yard freestyle, she set the NCAA Division II record at 9:55.86, and set school records in the 500-(4:52.72) and 1,650-yard

(16:45.01) freestyles.

A four-year all-America, Martin was also a member of the national championship 800-yard freestyle relay team as a junior, and placed second in the 500-yard freestyle that same year. Martin had four top-10 finishes as nationals as a sophomore and earned her first all-America honors with a fourth-place finish in the 1,650-yard freestyle as a freshman.

She was named the Honda NCAA Division II woman athlete of the year at the conclusion of her career.

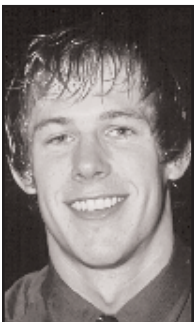
He coached an age-group team in Phoenix, Ariz., the Arizona Desert Fox, while doing an internship. Fanthorp also works in the University Career Center at Truman.

About Truman



Truman State University is Missouri's only statewide public liberal arts and sciences university and the only public university designated highly selective by the Missouri Coordinating Board for Higher Education.

Founded in 1867 as a normal school, Truman State University became the official name of Missouri's liberal arts and sciences university on July 1, 1996. Formerly known as Northeast Missouri State University, the change in name coincided with the 10th anniversary of the Missouri Legislature's action which changed the University's mission from that of a regional comprehensive university to the statewide liberal arts and sciences university. The new name complements the mission and honors the only Missourian to serve as president of the United States.

Now a nationally recognized university, Truman is a leader in its undaunting commitment to assessment and accountability. Truman's program of assessment allows the University to measure the results of the teaching-learning process and gather critical information on student growth and development to ensure that graduates are prepared for future success.

The University is consistently recognized as one of the nation's best educational values. Truman is recognized by *U.S. News & World Report* as the number one public regional university in the Midwest and it was selected as one of the top 100 best college buys by *America's 100 Best College Buys 2000*. Truman is also profiled in *Fiske Guide to Colleges* and *USA Today's College Guide*, as well as numerous other guides.

Truman's curriculum provides each student, regardless of intended specialization, with a foundation of knowledge appropriate to a traditional liberal arts and sciences education. It also requires major field specialization, providing each student with in-depth knowledge and mastery of a discipline. This exemplary undergraduate education provides graduates with the knowledge and skills necessary to be successful upon graduation. Approximately 40 percent of Truman's graduates enter graduate programs and professional schools in the two years following their graduation.

Truman's 6,300 students pursue degrees in 42 undergraduate and nine graduate areas of study in eight academic divisions.

Truman's students consistently rank among the highest in their high school graduating class. For example, the fall 2001 class has an average ACT score of 27, the 91st percentile nationally, while the high school grade-point was a 3.72 on a 4.00 scale. In addition to their academic ability, more than 99 percent had leadership roles in high school.

Truman State University is committed to the advancement of knowledge, to freedom of thought and inquiry, and to the personal, social and intellectual growth of each of its students. The University strives to maintain a recognized standard of excellence in all of its educational endeavors and a responsible stewardship of the resources provided by the people of Missouri.

Jack Magruder became the 13th president of Truman State University on July 1, 1994. Magruder began his career at Truman in 1964 as an assistant professor of chemistry. During his 22 years on the faculty, he achieved the rank of full professor before serving as head of the Division of Science from 1986-89. In

1989, Magruder became dean of instruction and was later appointed vice president for academic affairs, the position he held when he was named president.

Magruder is a member of a number of professional organizations, including the American Chemical Society, Phi Delta Kappa, Phi Kappa Phi Honor Society, Sigma Beta Delta Honor Society, National Association for Research in Science Teaching, National Science Teachers and the Science Teachers of Missouri. He is past-president of the Council of Public Liberal Arts Colleges and the Council on Public Higher Education.

Magruder is a 1957 graduate of Truman State University and is married to Sue Brimer Magruder, a 1955 and 1977 graduate of Truman. Their children, Julie Magruder Lochbaum, Kerry Magruder and Laura Magruder Mann are also graduates of Truman.

Jerry W. Wollmering began as Director of Athletics at Truman in September of 1999.

Wollmering had served as associate athletics director of finance and administration at Bowling Green State University in Ohio since January of 1998. He was also the assistant athletics director for financial affairs for two

years, prior to his becoming an associate AD.

Wollmering earned a bachelor's degree in business administration with a major in accounting from Drake University in 1987, and a master's degree in physical education with a major in athletic administration from Kent State University in 1993. He is also a certified public accountant with experience as an auditor.

Before arriving at Bowling Green, he was an assistant athletic director at Southeast Missouri State University, a Division I program, for approximately 18 months. While working on his master's degree, Wollmering was a graduate assistant to the athletic director at Kent.

A native of Ft. Madison, Iowa, he was a varsity letterman in cross country and track at Drake. Wollmering served on the NCAA Division I athletics certification self study subcommittees for fiscal integrity and commitment to equity, and was a member of the NCAA peer review team.

Wollmering and his wife, Alicia, have two daughters, Leah who is 5-years-old and, Erica who is 3-years-old. They are expecting their third child in February of 2002.

was the nickname, Bulldogs, selected for Truman State University? O.C. Bell is referred to his performers as Bulldogs, but it wasn't an official designation. So is known, this term wasn't used again until the spring of 1915. time, a committee of students, including the late President Emeritus Walter H. le, recommended the adoption of the "Bulldog" as the official emblem because of the beast's tenacity and ability to hold on and fight desperately to the end. The spirit of the Bulldog has been evident since the name was selected 86 years ago. It's not unique though, as at least 16 NCAA schools have adopted the bulldog".

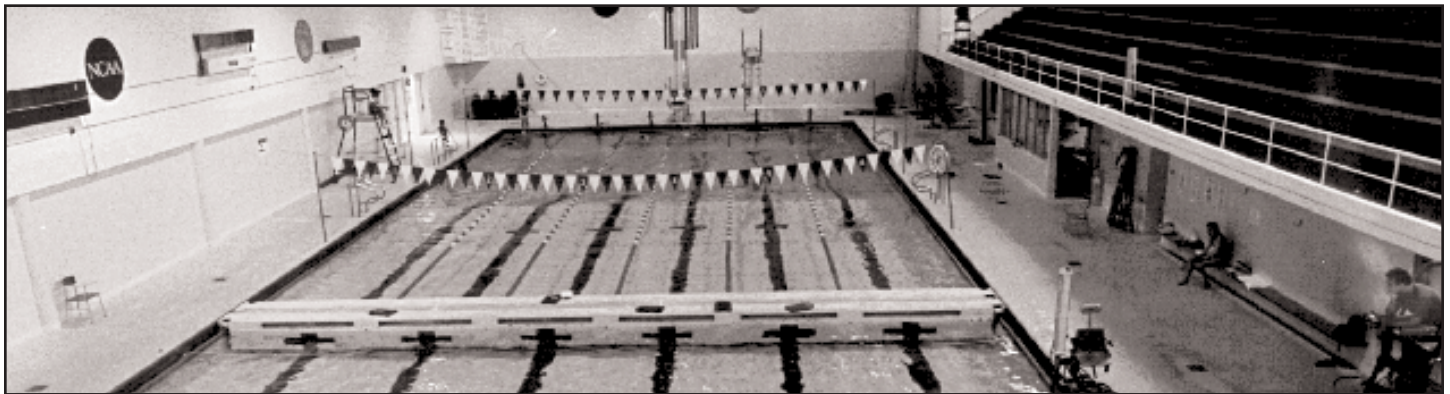
Pershing Building

Named in honor of General John J. Pershing, the commander of the American Expeditionary Forces to France during World War I and one of Truman's most distinguished alumni, Pershing Building is a two-story red brick and stone structure located on the south end of campus.

In 1967, a north wing was added to the building. The addition featured another gymnasium, a dance studio, classrooms and offices. Also included in the south wing are indoor racquetball courts and offices.

Pershing features a variety of athletics equipment, including a newly remodel weight room, an indoor rubber track and complete athletics training facilities.

In 1976, the south wing was added, which houses the Natatorium, with a six-lane, 40-yard swimming pool. The pool equipped with a movable bulkhead and electronic timing devices. The bright purple stands above the north side of the pool provide room for up to 500 fans.



Weight Rooms

Truman has three weight rooms that are at the disposal of the athletes. The largest is the free weights room which is located on the west side of the Pershing Arena on the third floor. This room was renovated during the summer of 2000. The renovations included new ventilation and equipment, and general refurbishment of the interior. Approximately 2,600 square feet, it accommodates 40-45 athletes at a time with eight separate power stations complete with platforms and bumper plates for a wide variety of strength training and rehabilitation. The Nautilus room is located on the east side of the arena near the ramp that leads to the natatorium. The third weight room is the aquatic weight room and is located at the bottom of the ramp on the east side.

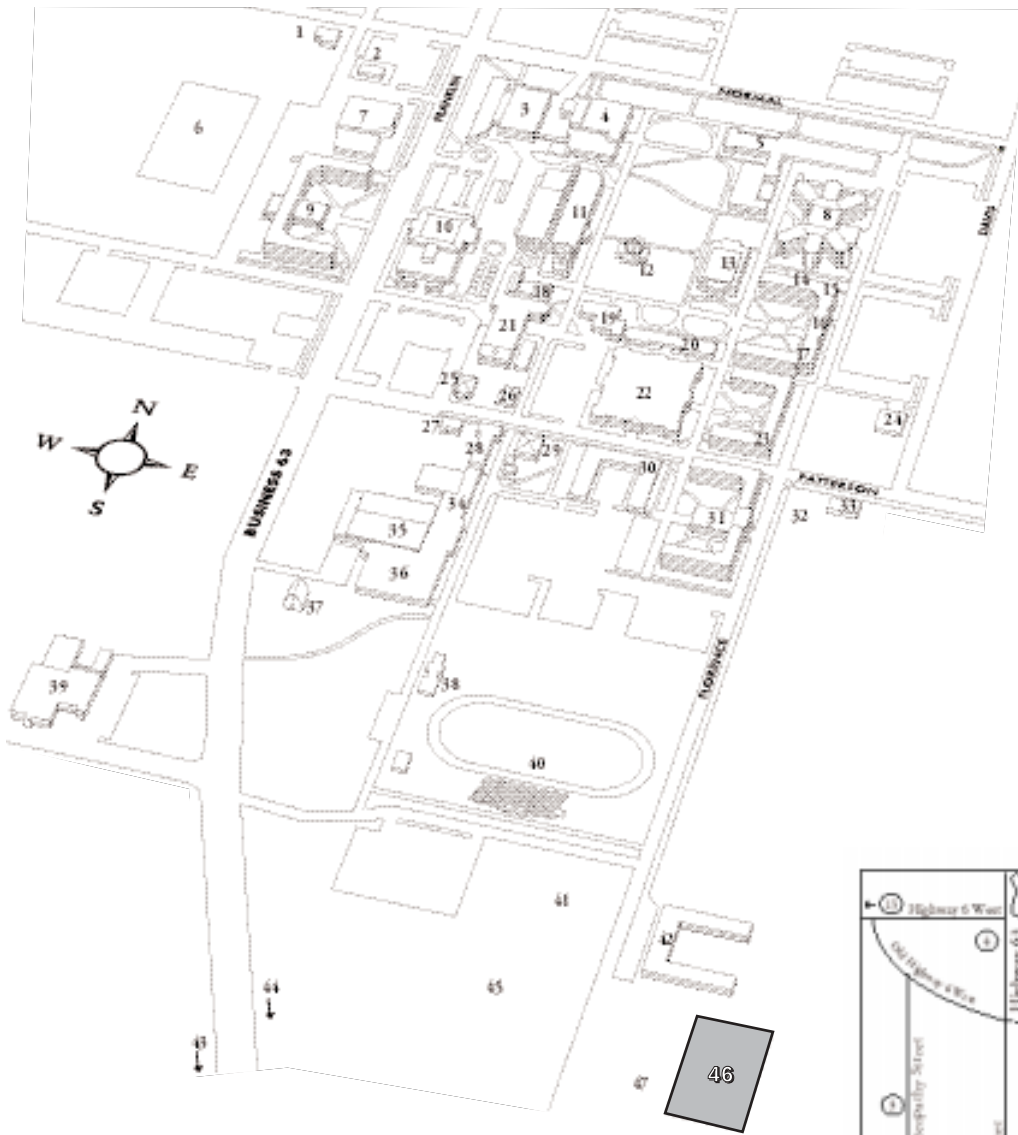
Sports Medicine

The training room is home base for the sports medicine program at Truman State University. The purpose of the program is to work toward the prevention of athletic injuries, care for those injuries that do happen and work for complete recovery through rehabilitation so that the student-athlete can return to competition as safely and quickly as possible. The program works under the direct supervision of three full-time experienced trainers and two physicians. If an athlete should be injured while participating in an intercollegiate sport, they will be evaluated by a highly competent training staff member and treated as needed or referred to necessary medical personnel.

The main training room is on the lower level of Pershing Building just off the northeast corner of Pershing Arena. Both the head athletics trainer's and assistant athletics trainer's offices are located in this area. The student trainers assigned to each sport also use this as their main area of contact.

A secondary training room in the football kennels, located south of Pershing Building, is mainly used during fall and spring practices because of its proximity to the football practice field and outdoor track.
