WOMEN THREE-PEAT AS NCAA DII CHAMPIONS

The Truman women's swimming team made it three-in-a-row when it won the 2003 NCAA Division II Swimming and Diving Championships. The Bulldogs scored 682 points to finish 272 points ahead of second-place Drury, the largest margin of victory in DII history.

First-year head coach Colleen Murphy was named NCAA Division II women's coach of the year as the Bulldog women claimed five individual titles and four relay titles, breaking four DII records in the process.

The 'Dogs performed an impressive feat by qualifying 18 members for the national championship team, the maximum allowed by the NCAA, all of whom finished in the top 16 in at least one event to earn all-American honors.

Seniors *Kelli Dudley* and *Liz Hug* led the way for the Bulldogs, each bringing home two individual titles.

Dudley won the 400-yard individual medley, swimming a 4:20.67 in prelims to set a new Division II record and better her school mark by over three seconds. She also took first-place in the 200 backstroke, swimming a 2:00.49 in the prelims, to again shave time off of her school record. In addition, Dudley was runner-up in the 200 individual medley and 100 backstroke.

Hug took home victories in the 1,000 freestyle and 200 individual medley. She also finished second in the 500 freestyle

and fourth in the 200 freestyle.

Sophomore *Diana Betsworth* was the champion in the 500 freestyle after garnering three national titles in 2002. The defending national champion and NCAA record-holder in the 1,000 freestyle, Betsworth placed second to Hug this year,

while junior *Katie May* was third.

Betsworth was also the runner-up in the 100 and 200 freestyles, breaking her own school record in the 100 freestyle with her time of 50.81.

Even more impressive were the Bulldogs' relays. The Truman women captured

◆ The Truman women claimed the University's first national team title in 2001.

◆ Before claiming their first title in 2001, the women consistently rose to the top, placing fourth in 1998, third in 1999 and second in 2000.

◆ Coach Murphy earned the CSCAA women's coach of the year honor her first year as head coach in 2003. Former coach Seth Huston won the award for four straight years from 1999-2002.

◆ At the past three national championships, the women have earned 15 individual titles and 10 relay crowns.

◆ Last year, the women scored 682 points to finish 272 points ahead of second-place Drury, the largest margin of victory in Division II history.

◆ All 18 women on last year's national team earned all-American honors by placing among the top-16 in at least one event.

◆ The Bulldog women currently hold four out of five national records in relay events.

◆ Diana Betsworth holds the national record in the 200 freestyle (1:48.75) and 1,000 freestyle (9:55.47), while Liz Hug holds the 200 IM (2:02.98) record and Kelli Dudley the 400 IM (4:20.67) mark.

four out of five relay titles, breaking the national records in three of those races.

The winning 400 freestyle relay team of Hug, senior *Sara Hatcher*, Betsworth and sophomore *Sarah Dance* knocked 1.38 seconds off of the former standard with their time of 3:22.82.

The 'Dogs also shaved time off of their national records in the 200 and 400 medley relays to defend their crowns in those events. The 200 medley relay team of junior *Krista Pray*, sophomore *Michaela Osborn*, sophomore *Christina Blose* and Hatcher swam a 1:43.73 while the 400 medley relay team of Dudley, Osborn, Hug and Hatcher clocked a 3:47.73.

The 800 freestyle relay team of Hug, May, Dance and Betsworth claimed victory in the event, while the 200 freestyle relay team of Hatcher, freshman *Whitney Jensen*, Betsworth and Dance placed second with a school record time of 1:33.82.

Other top finishes included Hatcher's second-place showing in the 50 freestyle and sixth-place finish in the 100 freestyle.

Osborn finished third in the 100 breaststroke and took seventh in the 200 breaststroke, bettering her own school record with a time of 2:22.79.

May finished third in the 1,000 and 1,650 freestyles, ninth in the 100 backstroke and 10th in the 200 backstroke.

Dance was third in the 100 and 200 freestyles, fourth in the 200 individual medley and eighth in the 100 butterfly with her teammates junior *Alison Blyth* and freshman *Meredith Rocha* taking ninth and 10th in the 200 fly.

Krista Pray finished sixth in the 100 backstroke. She was also 12th in the 200 back while her teammate freshman *Kate Kresl* was 14th in the same event.

In the distance races, freshman *Katie Funk* finished fifth in the 1,650 freestyle, while teammates sophomore *Sarah Wells* was 12th, senior *Ellen Frick* finished 14th and Blyth was 15th.

Funk was sixth in the 500 freestyle followed by freshman *Aimee Gregor* who took 14th. Funk finished ninth in the 1,000 freestyle with Blyth finishing 13th and Frick taking 16th in the same event.

In the 200 freestyle, sophomore *Sue Ellen Thoma* was 14th with Funk taking 15th. Backing up Dudley in the 400 individual medley was Wells who took 11th in that event.

Other notable performances for the women included Dudley's lead-off leg in the 400 medley relay at the Central States

Championships where she clocked a 56.62 to better her own school record. Also breaking a school record at the meet was Rocha who swam a 56.99 to win the 100 butterfly. Rocha also broke the Truman mark in the 200 butterfly at the Delta State Invitational, swimming a 2:05.12 to win the event.

In all, the 2002-03 season saw the Bulldog women break four NCAA Division II national records and 11 school records and claim nine national titles.

IN 2003, THE MEN'S TEAM achieved a 12th-place finish at the NCAA Division II championships as all six men earned all-American status.

The 'Dogs were led by multiple-time all-American, senior *Matt Pray*. Pray finished out his career third in the 200 butterfly with a school record time of 1:47.99. He also placed fourth in the 100 butterfly, clocking a 48.58 in the prelims, good for another school record. In addition, Pray led off the 400 freestyle relay with a school record time of 45.90 seconds.

In 2001, Pray became the highest placing men's swimmer ever at Truman when he finished second in the 100 butterfly, just behind Southern Connecticut State's Ben Michaelson who narrowly missed the American record in the event at the 2003 championships.

The team of juniors *Brian Teson* and *Andy Harken*, Pray and freshman *Josh Otis* achieved the second-highest finish in school history by a Bulldog men's relay team, placing fourth in the 400 medley. Their time of 3:23.55 cut nearly two seconds off the previous school record. The same swimmers teamed up in the 200 medley relay to take 10th-place.

The men's 800 freestyle relay put up an impressive performance as well. The team of Teson, Otis, Pray and junior *Robby Cooper* placed sixth, breaking the school standard with their time of 6:52.54.

Harken, Pray, Otis and junior *Vince Struble* comprised the eighth-place 200 freestyle relay.

Otis had the highest individual finish behind Pray, finishing 10th in the 200 individual medley, narrowly missing the school record with his time of 1:53.81.

Cooper was 15th in the 1,650 freestyle at nationals after setting the school record at the Delta State Invitational with his time of 16:03.88.

Harken and Teson were 16th in the 100 breaststroke and 100 butterfly, respectively.

The 2002-03 season saw six men's school records fall, and the Bulldogs hope to do more damage this year with a strong senior class.

HEAD COACH COLLEEN MURPHY



M.A. – Kentucky, '99

Colleen Murphy, a native of Grand Blanc, Mich., begins her second season as head swimming coach at Truman State University in 2003-04.

During her first year as head coach of the Bulldogs, she guided the women's team to its third-straight first-place finish at the NCAA Division II championships, as the team claimed five individual NCAA titles and four relay crowns. It was the largest margin of victory in NCAA Division II history and was the first year that the maximum of 18 members qualified for the national team and earned all-American honors.

Murphy guided the women to four national records and 11 school records, producing nine national champions. Under Murphy, the men finished 12th in the nation with six swimmers becoming all-Americans. She was named the 2002-03 NCAA Division II women's coach of the year.

Before becoming the head coach in 2002, Murphy served as an assistant to former head coach Seth Huston for two years and helped guide the women's team to the school's first ever national team title in 2001 and a runner-up finish in 2000. The men's squad placed 16th at the national meet in 2001 and had its second-best finish ever of ninth in 2000.

During Murphy's tenure as assistant

coach at Truman, the Bulldog swimmers won six individual NCAA titles and four relay national championships. In just those two years, the Bulldog swimmers produced 22 all-Americans.

In 2001, senior Jess Martin was named the NCAA Division II swimmer of the year by the National Swimming Coaches Association, and went on to win the Honda NCAA Division II Woman of the Year award as well. In all, the Bulldog women broke 17 of 19 school records and the men set 10 school standards while Murphy was an assistant coach.

In September of 2001, Murphy took the position of assistant coach for the University of Iowa women's swimming team, and then served a brief stint as an assistant at Penn State University for the men's and women's swimming teams.

While at Iowa, the women's swimming team improved to seventh in the Big 10 Conference and qualified two women automatically and three women provisionally for the NCAA Division I swimming championships. In addition, Murphy coached a swimmer to a ninth-place finish and honorable mention all-American status in the 200 breaststroke at the D-I championships. The Hawkeye women broke 10 school records during Murphy's year at Iowa, where she was in charge of the sprint and breaststroke training groups.

In the summer of 2001, Murphy served as the head counselor for the Longhorn Swim Camp at the University of Texas at Austin. She directed a group of 12 counselors and assisted the Texas coaching staff in running workouts, stroke technique and dryland training for a camp of 150 swimmers each week.

Prior to coming to Truman, she served as the

head age group coach at Wildcat Aquatics in Lexington, Ky., while completing her master's degree in history at the University of Kentucky. Her duties included planning and instituting practices for various age groups, and focusing on fundamentals, technique and endurance. Murphy also maintained team records, handled meet entries and was in charge of team communications. Wildcat Aquatics is a top-ranked USS swim club in the state of Kentucky. Murphy also served as a teaching assistant in the history department at Kentucky and was assistant coach for the Spindletop Hall swim team in Lexington.

She earned a bachelor of arts degree in history from Oakland University (Mich.), graduating cum laude. Murphy was also a member of the Oakland swimming team that earned a Division II championship in 1994 and was runner-up in 1995, 1996 and 1997. While a member of the OU team, she was named an all-American five times and was a three-time academic all-American. Murphy is married to Joe Fanthorp and they reside in Kirksville.



ASSISTANT COACH JOE FANTHORP

Joe Fanthorp returns for his third year as an assistant coach after contributing as an interim assistant last year and on a volunteer basis two years ago.

Fanthorp plays an integral role in the success of the team, and works daily with the sprinters and breaststrokers. He also serves as recruiting coordinator for the team.

The past two years, Fanthorp has helped guide the women's team to its second and third-straight NCAA Division II titles. The men's team finished ninth in 2002 and 12th in 2003.

He is also the administrative head coach for the Truman Aquatics Swim Team, an age-group team in Kirksville.

Fanthorp coached an age-group team in Phoenix, Ariz., as well, the Arizona Desert Fox. While with the Desert Fox, he assisted with the senior team that produced one Olympic gold medalist, three Olympic trial qualifiers and several other USA Swimming national

championship qualifiers.

He graduated from the University of Kentucky in 1999 with a degree in biology, and was an assistant coach for Wildcat Aquatics in Lexington, Ky., for three years. Fanthorp is married to head coach Colleen Murphy.

Last year, Dudley was selected as one of 29 women nationwide to receive a prestigious NCAA postgraduate scholarship.



◆ LIZ HUG Student Assistant Coach

Hug swam for the Bulldogs from 1999-03 becoming a 12-time national champion and 28-time all-American. She currently holds the NCAA Division II record in the 200 IM (2:02.98), as the butterfly leg on the 400 medley relay (3:47.73), as part of the 400 free relay (3:22.82) and as part of the 800 free relay (7:23.60). Last year, Hug was selected as one of 29 women nationwide to receive a prestigious NCAA postgraduate scholarship.



◆ SARA HATCHER Student Assistant Coach

Hatcher swam for the Bulldogs from 1999-03 becoming an eight-time national champion and 23-time all-American. She currently holds NCAA Division II records as part of the 200 medley relay (1:43.73), 400 medley relay (3:47.73) and 400 free relay (3:22.82).

The 2003-04 Bulldog women's swim team, after winning its third straight national title last year, looks to be as strong this year despite the loss of three outstanding swimmers in *Kelli Dudley*, *Liz Hug* and *Sara Hatcher*. The returning Bulldogs should have all the tools to rise to the challenge of filling these spots.

This year's team returns 14 of 18 members of last year's national championship team. Six of those swimmers are returning national champions, five of whom hold NCAA Division II records.

Junior *Diana Betsworth* is the top returner for the women, holding four NCAA Division II records. Also holding national records are senior *Krista Pray* and juniors *Christina Blose*, *Sarah Dance* and *Michaela Osborn*. Senior *Katie May* returns as a national champion.

The 2003-04 freshman class boasts large numbers and should add to the team's depth this season. A few freshmen to watch for are *Lija Kaleps-Clark*, *Brittany Anderson* and *Kathleen Moyer*, who could prove to be at the top of their events for the Bulldogs. Freshmen *Whitney Burtch*, *Lyndsay McReynolds*, *Lindsay Vaughn*, *Shannan Schoening*, *Bridget Brunsman* and *Emily Chadwick* should all be strong competitors for the Bulldogs as well.

Seniors *Alison Blyth* and *Calie Fulmer* will serve as captains of the women's team.

FREESTYLE

In the sprint events, Coach Murphy believes that sophomore *Whitney Jensen* will step up and fill the hole created by the loss of *Hatcher*. Also seeing time in the sprint events will be *Fulmer*, *Blose*, junior *Sue Ellen Thoma*, *Anderson*, *Moyer* and *Schoening*.

One of the strongest areas for the Bulldog freestylers is in the middle-distance events. Top returners include *Betsworth*, *Dance*, *Thoma* and sophomores *Katie Funk*, *Aimee Gregor* and *Kristen Halet*, all of whom achieved national cuts last season. Other upperclassmen looking to contribute points are senior *Lindsey Ehret*, junior *Cassie Roudebush* and sophomore *Jackie Lopez*. Also look for newcomers *Moyer*, *Schoening* and freshman *Krista Wray* to contend as well.

In the distance freestyle events, *Betsworth* returns as the top contender after placing first in the 500 and second in the 1,000 at last year's NCAA meet. Rounding out the distance freestylers are *May*, *Blyth*, junior *Sarah Wells*, *Gregor* and *Funk*. *McReynolds*, *Wray* and *Burtch* also look to find a place in this group.

BUTTERFLY

The butterfly events are led by *Dance*, *Blyth* and sophomore *Meredith Rocha*, who broke both the 100 and 200 butterfly records last season. Other promising flyers with national experience include *Blose* and

juniors *Gina Fettig* and *Megan Losee*.

Freshmen who should see time in the butterfly events are *Wray*, *McReynolds*, *Lindsay Vaughn*, *Chadwick* and *Erin Silva*.

BACKSTROKE

Two national scorers return in the backstroke races in *May* and *Pray* who will lead the way.

Other upperclassmen looking to contribute are *Fulmer* and *Lopez*.

Top freshmen in the backstroke events are *Burtch*, *Kaleps-Clark* and *Chadwick*.

BREASTSTROKE

Michaela Osborn leads the way in the breaststroke events as she holds both the 100 and 200 breaststroke school records. She was also the breaststroke leg on the NCAA record-setting 200 and 400 medley relay teams.

Upperclassmen adding depth are *Losee*, *Wells* and *Fettig*. In addition, a strong recruiting class looks to contribute to the breaststroke events this season. *Vaughn*, *Anderson* and freshman *Brigit Brunsman* should add much-needed depth.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

With the loss of *Hug* and *Dudley*, the individual medley races will see many new faces. *Kaleps-Clark* and *McReynolds* are sure to be top IMers for the Bulldogs.

Strong returners include *Dance*, *Wells* and *Fettig* who are all all-Americans in individual medley events. *Blyth*, *Losee* and *Gregor* will also provide depth in this area.

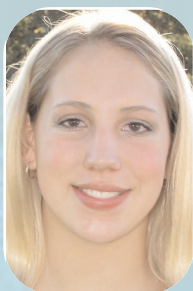

MEN'S SEASON PREVIEW

The 2003-04 men's team looks to build on last year's success. The Bulldog men boast a large and talented senior class of seven swimmers, six of whom are three-time letterwinners. This experience should prove to be beneficial for the Bulldogs as they also welcome back six all-Americans.

However, the men will have to bounce back from the loss of *Matt Pray* who placed third in the 200 butterfly and fourth in the 100 butterfly at nationals last year.

Top returners for the Bulldogs are sophomore *Josh Otis* and seniors *Robby Cooper*, *Andy Harken* and *Brian Teson*. All of these men placed in the top 16 in at least one individual event at last year's national meet.

Other returning all-Americans include senior *Vince Struble* and junior *Phil Brown*. They have swam crucial legs on relays that have placed in the top eight at nationals in the past.

The freshman class looks to be small yet talented with *Tom Applegate*, *Robert Fletcher*, *Chris Hagan* and *Denis Potts* looking to be strong contributors to the team.

This year's men's team captains are Andy Harken and Phil Brown.

FREESTYLE

Struble and juniors *Nick Joslin* and *Ashtyn Beek* look to be the main sprint freestylers this season, with Harken and Otis filling in where needed. Mur-

phy hopes freshman Tom Applegate will develop into one of the top sprinters while Fletcher will also see time in the sprint events.

Cooper, Otis and Brown are the top returners in the middle-distance events and all have experience at the national meet. Also look for Fletcher to post some fast times in these events.

Providing support in the middle-distance events are Beek, Joslin, Hagan, Potts and sophomore *Mike Wasikowski*.

Cooper should be the strongest contender in the distance freestyle events after finishing 15th in the 1,650, 18th in the 1,000 and 20th in the 500 at nationals last year. He holds the school records in both the 500 and 1,650 freestyle events.

Senior *Ryan Jacobi*, Brown, junior *Eric Paden* and Wasikowski round out the distance squad.

BUTTERFLY

With the loss of Matt Pray in the butterfly events, Teson and sophomore *Chris Brammer* look to be the top returners poised to fill the void. Paden and junior *Dustin Engels* are some of the top returners in the 200 butterfly.

Also adding depth to the fly events are Harken, Fletcher, Joslin and Hagan.

BACKSTROKE

Teson, senior *Bryan Meyer* and sophomore *Derek Duffy* are the top returners in the backstroke events.

Teson led the team in both the 100 and 200 backstroke events last year while Duffy was mainly a threat in the 100 back and Meyer in the 200 back.

Don't count out freshmen Robert Fletcher to be near the top in the backstroke events as well.

BREASTSTROKE

Harken again returns as the premier breastroker this season after placing 16th in the 100 and 21st in the 200 at nationals in 2003.

Backing up Harken are Struble, junior *Justin Brosseau*, Otis and sophomore *Andrew Wright*.

INDIVIDUAL MEDLEY

Josh Otis returns as the top IMer this season after posting the fastest times in both the 200 and 400 last season. He narrowly missed the school record in the 200 IM at nationals a year ago.

In the 200 IM he is backed by Teson, Harken, Duffy and Brammer. Adding depth in the 400 are Brown, Brosseau and Paden.

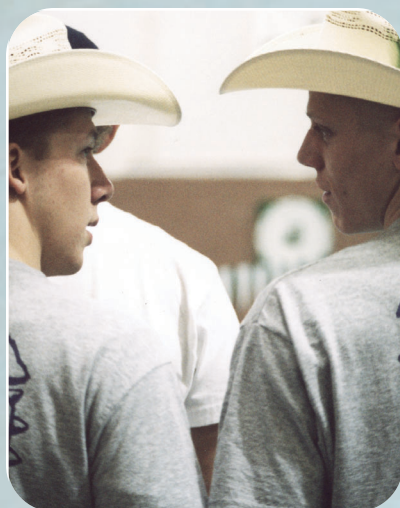

TRAINING AT TRUMAN

Season Plan

The season strategy is broken down throughout the year into month to month, week to week and even day to day strategies. For the most part the team is broken into three distinct groups; sprints, middle distances and distances.

Preparation Phase

The preparation phase builds endurance and technique. The swimmer begins to get a feel for the water. Ideally, this phase should be as short as possible because the swimmers already should be at that level coming into the season. The teams swim basic aerobic sets, mixes in different strokes, and emphasizes technique. On land, the swimmers mix in some running and general strength training; push ups, dips, pull ups, jumps, etc. Another component emphasized is core body strength. The first few weeks are spent teaching the teams all of the core exercises that are built on the rest of the year.

Aerobic Phase

The purpose of the aerobic phase is to build an aerobic base. The sprinters' training differs from distance swimmers in this case. An aerobic foundation aids in recovery time following race pace, enhances ability to maintain speed through efficiency and aids in reinforcing proper technique and body position. The latter half of September and the majority of October focus on building aerobic capacity.

Race Pace Fall Phase

Gradually, the team builds in more race specific training for each group. ATP (short sprints), lactate adaptation, lactate tolerance and broken swims are techniques used to get individuals used to swimming in racing conditions. Since the team is competing nearly every weekend through this phase, training is set up for recovery just prior to most meets.

Fall Rest Meet

Much of the team tapers for a large meet in December. Finals week provides a time for real recovery and light, loosen-up swimming. The week prior to the December meet, intensity will be reduced, but the training time will remain constant. Following the December rest, the team heads home to train with their clubs for the holiday season.

Winter Break and Florida Trip

Training at home over the break is required. The Florida trip is the biggest team-building opportunity of the season. Team cohesion and

leadership, in order to achieve success, are worked on in Florida. Training emphasizes a mix of basic aerobic swimming, VO2 max training and a little lactate production. It includes both long course and short course, as well as daily dry land workouts. The Florida trip is a challenging one, but the swimmers return in very good shape.

Race Pace Spring Phase

In January, sprint training, lactate tolerance and broken swims resume. Each swimmer learns their stroke rate (tempo) for each race. Swimmers concentrate on strategy and on how to mentally prepare for their races.

Final Taper

This is the final sharpening and tuning stage. Time to rest and recover the body is allowed, while at the same time, the team sharpens tempo and pacing skills. Ideally, taper is three weeks or less, and many times, distance swimmers and some of the middle distance women will rest one week or less.

Mental Training

The team spends time on positive thinking. A positive team attitude and atmosphere facilitates positive habits and life skills. Respect and support of teammates is encouraged. Short term and long term goals are set. Visualizing positive outcomes in training, daily life and competitions is practiced.

Dryland Training

Early in the season, building muscular endurance is emphasized, laying the foundation to a strong, flexible, fit body for the year. As the season progresses, the team builds in more power oriented exercises. By the peak performance zones (December, February-March) as much specific muscular power and endurance as possible is created in order to help the mind and body push through all-out maximal racing efforts again and again. Muscular and joint flexibility, shoulder strength, core body strength and dynamic movements are concentrated on throughout the season.

Weight Training

Weight training is primarily used to build general muscle strength, endurance and power. Workouts are centered around several primary exercises, the squat, dead lift, hang clean and bench press. Initially, strength building is emphasized, and the last phase incorporates power building. Significant strength gains are made by the team through the season.

Academic Excellence

Truman swimmers excel in and out of the water. Last year, the teams were recognized for their outstanding academic abilities by the NCAA, College Swimming Coaches Association of America, Verizon Academic all-American Program and Mid-America Intercollegiate Athletics Association conference.

Seniors Kelli Dudley and Liz Hug were each selected by the NCAA to receive a \$6,900 post-graduate scholarship. Dudley and Hug were among 29 women nationwide participating in a winter sport to receive the prestigious award.

Sarah Dance was named an MIAA presidential scholar for the second straight year, while Mike Wasikowski earned the award for the first time. Members of the team must have a cumulative grade point average of 4.0.

In addition, seniors Matt Pray, Kelli Dudley, Liz Hug, Ellen Frick and Sara Hatcher; junior Alison Blyth; sophomores Diana Betsworth, Sarah Dance, Sue Ellen Thoma, Michaela Osborn and Christina Blose; and freshmen Kate Kresl, Meredith Rocha and Katie Funk were all named CSCAA academic all-Americans. Earning honorable mention academic all-American honors were juniors Ryan Jacobi, Bryan Meyer and Calie Fulmer; sophomore Gina Fettig; and freshmen Derek Duffy, Chris Brammer and Kristin Halet.

Dance and Dudley were named to the Verizon Academic All-American At-Large First-Team while Liz Hug was named to the second team. Dance, Dudley and Hug were all named to the Verizon Academic All-District VII At-Large First-Team. Members are nominated and voted on after meeting minimum requirements of having sophomore status and a cumulative grade point average of 3.2.

Betsworth, Blose, Blyth, Dance, Dudley, Frick, Funk, Hug, Osborn, Rocha, Thoma, and Matt Pray were also named academic all-MIAA. Members of the academic all-MIAA team must have won all-American honors and maintain a cumulative grade point average of at least 3.5.

Several Truman swimmers were also named to the at-large MIAA commissioner's academic honor roll. To be a member, individuals must have a cumulative GPA of at least 3.0, have completed at least two terms at the nominating institution and have sophomore athletic eligibility.

Truman State University's mission is to provide Missouri students access to an outstanding liberal arts educational experience in a public institution setting that is normally available only at costly, private sector institutions.

President Barbara Dixon



Barbara Dixon became the 14th president of Truman State University on July 1, 2003. Dixon is the first female to serve as Truman's president.

Before coming to Truman, Dixon served as provost and vice president for academic affairs at the State University of New York at Geneseo, a public liberal arts university, from 1997-2003.

She previously spent 27 years at Central Michigan University where she was a faculty member, chair of the Academic Senate and associate dean and interim dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. Dixon has both a B.M. and M.M. in applied piano from Michigan State University and a D.M.A. in piano performance, literature and pedagogy from the University of Colorado.

She is a member of several honor societies including Alpha Lambda Delta, Mortar Board, Pi Kappa Lambda and Phi Kappa Phi. Dixon also holds memberships in the National Music Teachers Association and Delta Omicron, a professional music organization, and is an honorary member of Phi Eta Sigma and Golden Key.

Director of Athletics Jerry Wollmering



Jerry W. Wollmering began as Director of Athletics at Truman in September of 1999.

Wollmering served as associate athletics director of finance and administration at Bowling Green State University in Ohio since January of 1998. He was also the assistant athletics director for financial affairs for two years at BGSU, prior to

his becoming an associate AD.

Wollmering earned a bachelor's degree in business administration and accounting from Drake University in 1987, and a master's degree in physical education and athletic administration from Kent State University in 1993. He is also a certified public accountant with experience as an auditor.

Before arriving at Bowling Green, Wollmering was an assistant athletic director at Southeast Missouri State University, a Division I program, for approximately 18 months. While working on his master's degree, Wollmering was a graduate assistant to the athletic director at Kent.

A native of Ft. Madison, Iowa, he was a varsity letterman in cross country and track at Drake. Wollmering and his wife, Alicia, have three daughters, Leah who is 7-years-old, Erica who is 5-years-old and Kate, who is one.

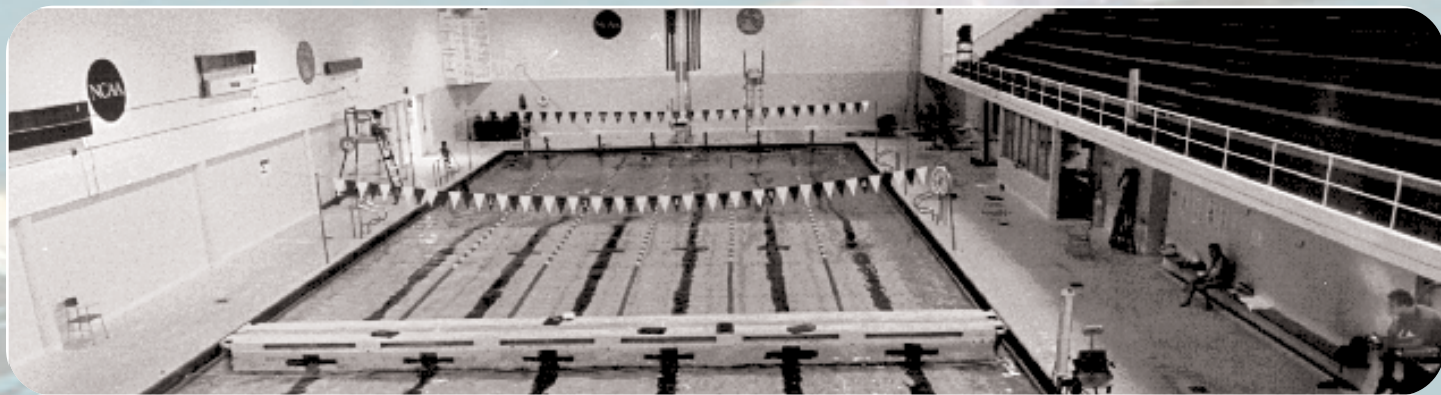

PERSHING BUILDING FACILITIES & NATATORIUM

Named in honor of General John J. Pershing, the commander of the American Expeditionary Forces to France during World War I and one of Truman's most distinguished alumni, Pershing Building is a two-story red brick and stone structure located on the south end of campus. In 1967, a north wing was added to the building. The addition featured another gymnasium, a dance studio, classrooms and offices. Also included in the south wing are indoor racquetball courts and offices.

Pershing features a variety of athletics equipment, including a remodeled weight room, an indoor rubber track and complete athletics training facilities.

In 1976, the south wing was added, which houses the Natatorium, with a six-lane, 40-yard swimming pool. The pool is equipped with a movable bulkhead and electronic timing devices. The stands above the north side of the pool provide room for up to 500 fans.



WEIGHT ROOMS

Truman has three weight rooms that are at the disposal of student-athletes. The largest is the free weights room which is located on the west side of the Pershing Arena on the third floor. This room was renovated during the summer of 2000. Renovations included new ventilation and equipment, and general refurbishment of the interior. Approximately 2,600 square feet, it accommodates 40-45 athletes at a time with eight separate power stations complete with platforms and bumper plates for a wide variety of strength training and rehabilitation. The Nautilus room is located on the east side of the arena near the ramp that leads to the natatorium. The third weight room is the aquatic weight room and is located at the bottom of the ramp on the east side.

WHAT'S IN A NICKNAME?

Why was the nickname, Bulldogs, selected for Truman State University? O.C. Bell in 1908 referred to his performers as Bulldogs, but it wasn't an official designation. So far as is known, this term wasn't used again until the spring of 1915.

At the time, a committee of students, including the late President Emeritus Walter H. Ryle, recommended the adoption of the "Bulldog" as the official emblem because of the beast's tenacity and ability to fight desperately to the end.

The spirit of the Bulldog has been evident since the name was selected 89 years ago. It's not unique though, as at least 16 NCAA schools have adopted the "Bulldog" as their mascot.



SPORTS MEDICINE

The training room is home base for the sports medicine program at Truman State University. The purpose of the program is to work toward the prevention of athletic injuries, care for those injuries that do happen and work for complete recovery through rehabilitation so that the student-athlete can return to competition as safely and quickly as possible. The program operates under the direct supervision of four full-time experienced trainers and two physicians. If an athlete should be injured while participating in an intercollegiate sport, they will be evaluated by a highly competent training staff member and treated as needed or referred to necessary medical personnel.

The main training room is on the lower level of Pershing Building just off the northeast corner of Pershing Arena. Both the head athletics trainer's and assistant athletics trainer's offices are located in this area. The student trainers assigned to each sport also use this as their main area of contact.

A secondary training room in the football kennels, located south of Pershing Building, is mainly used during fall and spring practices because of its proximity to the football practice field and outdoor track.
